From The Rectory

It was wonderful to see so many of our village families enjoying themselves and there was enough shade for us all when not playing or umpiring. Huge thanks to the umpires and scorers, to Friends of Findon Church for the refreshments and above all to Richard and his team of helpers for organising the day. Of course, I mustn't forget to thank the Parish Council for allowing us to use the green for this village event. We're already looking forward to next year! After the isolation of the last 16 months it was fantastic to see village families out enjoying themselves together again!

Another highlight towards the end of July was the open air theatre production of 'Blithe Spirit' hosted by Caroline Hill at Findon Place. The acting was superb and it is such a lovely setting. We were blessed with lovely weather to enjoy our picnics before the performance and there were drinks available both then and during the interval. Again, it was wonderful to see so many villagers, as well as others, enjoying a live performance after months of lock-down.

Being a Parish Priest is varied, and I am often asked if it is difficult to take funerals. I always answer it is not, but rather a privilege to accompany people in what is such a difficult time for them. It is occasions like this that make me so thankful that I am the Vicar of these three lovely villages here, each of which has such a lovely 'family' feel to it, where generations have lived in the village and some continue to do so.

As I write, I am reflecting on what 'freedom day' means to you and me! Personally, I will continue to carry a mask and use it if in a crowded space or if asked to in a venue, and to maintain a reasonable distance from people outside my immediate circle. I hope and pray that everyone else will continue to think of those around them not just themselves as we learn to live with what is still a pandemic. Once enough of the population have been fully vaccinated, hopefully it will be something we have to live with like seasonal flu. In our churches, although masks will no longer be compulsory, we would still advise people to wear one while numbers of infections remain high and we will encourage people to be sensibly spaced apart. From now on, we are again able to sing in church hooray! We will still continue to sing our last hymn outside while the weather holds as so many people have said they enjoy this!

Remembering Gladys (Lambourne)

Many of you will have read stories of her life in the Findon News. She was born in Rose Cottage and lived in the village all her life (92 years). We heard many a story from her over the years – too many to put in the magazine. She was always laughing and saw the funny side to most things.

One was when she was still at home. Her mum bought a table at Northend and they pushed it along the bypass, then couldn't get it in the door, so the legs were chopped down a bit! It didn't last long as it took up so much room and ended up as firewood.

When the children came along they would often go on picnics. Glad would make a Shepherd's pie, and as the car engine was in the back of the car there was a ledge for the pie to keep warm so that they could eat something hot on their arrival.

Glad wrote in her diary every day. She liked writing to people and when she became ill would write to anyone she could think of, and loved getting replies from them.

I've lived next to Glad and her family for over 50 years. We used to have Halloween parties in the dark in Bushrods Field (now Nightingales) or in her home, and she would make up stories. She would have a bag which we had to feel inside as the story was read. There were shrieks of laughter as some things were not very nice to touch!

Another time Glad did a Last Night of the Proms. We all had pots and pans to bang in time to the music. Sylvia, who lived the other side of Glad, joined in as well. Good times were had by all.

Sylvia also remembers when her kitchen curtains caught fire and Glad jumped the fence to come to her aid.


Glad also loved to knit and would make a pram blanket and teddy for my grandchildren and many others as they came along. She also knitted animals for her great grandson in Yorkshire who was reading a book with lots of animals in it. No pattern was needed as she could make things without.

Glad was a founder member of Findon Downs WI. She also belonged to the Friendship club (now soup & pud) and the Findon gardens Assoc, and regularly attended Film Nights. After these events we would sit in my car and put the world to rights, always laughing as she could find the funny side of everything.

She also loved Jumble Sales and would alter and unpick things she bought to remake them. Recycling was nothing new to her.

She was a great friend and neighbour and we will miss her so much.

Shepherding through the summer

July and August are months when the lambs continue to grow having been fed on grass and a food supplement called Creep. Keeping an eye on the flock twice a day is important although 90% of the time they are fine, there is always a chance something is amiss. Recently early one morning a lamb was found with its head caught in the stock fencing which resolved itself quite quickly.

Many country shows have been cancelled for a second year including our own Findon Sheep Fair, but some are going ahead at the end of August and mid-September. These shows over the years have been a way of life for the farming community where they would meet up with friends. At the Findon Sheep fair over the centuries, shepherds used to get their work for the next year by meeting farmers on Nepcote Green.

The Nepcote flock generally go to 4/5 shows during the summer and this year for the very first time, we are going to the Edenbridge and Oxted show over the Bank holiday weekend 29/30 August. To be able to show sheep you need to halter train the lambs at an early age and this we have been working on since they were two weeks old. The halter is a rope around their neck and over the nose with no discomfort for the sheep or cattle if you are showing either of the farm animals. Another show which are planned to visit is the West Grinstead Ploughing match on Sat 18th September and this year it will be held at **Priors Byne Farm, West Grinstead, West Sussex**. This is a very good day out for the whole family. As well as 50 plus tractors and horses ploughing, there are tractor trailer rides around the fields, competition's held in the barns, lots of stalls and sheep and cattle judging.

From Findon Parish Council

Findon Parish Council (FPC) held its first full Council face to face meeting on 28 June 2021 in Findon Village Hall since the pandemic restrictions were relaxed. Following advice, the meeting carried a limited Agenda of essential business. We remain hopeful that following lifting of the COVID restrictions from 19 July we can hold a truly full meeting on Monday 9 August in the Village Hall.

Sean Hellett was co-opted at the meeting and we welcome Sean to the Council. This means that FPC now has a full complement of 11 councillors.

Parking and speeding are issues not only within the village but in villages everywhere. The village response to FPC's parking and speeding survey has been amazing (**324** responses from the **852** leaflets distributed to households which represents a response rate of **38%**) and a huge 'thank you' in appreciation is given to our community. The Working Group will now collate and analyse this information and publish its findings as soon as possible.

In addition, the Headmaster of the St John the Baptist School has kindly carried out a survey, which we provided, of the parents as we felt it important to have the parents perspective as to the problems they encounter. This has now been completed and once we have the results we can analyse their responses.

Similarly, there has been helpful and constructive comment from the consultation on Homewood Play area renovation. Using this feedback, a design brief and tender document has been created by Arun District Council and will soon go to contractors to restart the process.

The West Sussex County Council (WSCC) proposal to install a cycle lane from Findon to Findon Valley was presented recently, and support for a cycle lane was already in our Neighbourhood Plan. The proposal, which has government funding, is for a shared path (pedestrians and cyclists) of some 3 metres width. A segregated set of paths is very difficult on the current footprint and would command a very much larger budget and FPC regard this proposal as a good development for the village. We hope you can support it.

A period of public consultation runs from 19 July to 15 August 2021. As part of this consultation on-line access for residents within the WSCC website will be available at A24 Findon Valley / Your Voice West Sussex and information circulated via shop posters and cards to local households.

Finally, I am sure many of you will have noticed the height of the vegetation growth in the central reservation of the A24 from the Black Horse to Cross Lane Nepcote. This created safety issues with lack of visibility at the junctions. After escalation to WSCC Highways and the subsequent involvement of WSCC Cllr Deborah Urquhart, the cutting back scheduled for 19/20 July will allow for safe crossing of the junctions. FPC would like to thank Cllr Urquhart for her support.

Paws Animal Sanctuary

We have had so many baby birds and injured pigeons needing to go to the wildlife hospitals. Luckily Angela, one of our volunteers, goes past the Wildlife Aid Hospital in Leatherhead on her way home on Sundays. She often takes one or two pigeons in each week. Last week we were given a tiny baby robin. I rang Emma at the Brent Lodge Wildlife Hospital in Sidlesham to ask what I should feed it on. She said to put it in a cardboard box and take it straight over. There was some sort of car festival going on, the roads were so busy, bumper to bumper all the way there and back. Luckily the baby robin was still alive when we reached Brent Lodge.

That evening I told the lady who was treating Elvis the Pony with her acupuncture machine how long we had sat in traffic (all day) to take a baby bird to the wildlife hospital. She asked me why we went all that way when there is a wildlife rescue just down the road. It's called Sompting Wildlife Rescue. It's a charity run by two vet nurses from Coastways Vets in Hove. Such good news, why didn't anyone tell us before.

We are just as busy with so many animals but the messages every day are from people asking us to take even more, mainly rabbits and guinea-pigs and today another mini-pig! It has grown too big for the owners back garden.

I feel so sorry for rabbits kept in rabbit hutches this hot weather. They are like ovens. People ring me asking what to do when their rabbits get fly-strike. It's too late for the poor rabbit, they die being eaten by maggots. They should ban all rabbit hutches, rabbits will use a litter tray if given one. They should be kept in a shed of their own with a run on the lawn in the summer. Rabbits have got to be the most neglected of all pets.

I have just spent hours this evening with a torch searching for an escaped tortoise. If we don't put a heavy weight on top of the pen out on the lawn she is out and in hiding. She saw her chance when somebody forgot to put the weight on this morning. It wasn't me!



'In the Heights' - review

Musical films that border the line between film excellence and faithful adaptations are hard to come by, some do not even fit both criteria. This year we seem to have been blessed with three highly-anticipated musical films, this film, the remake of West Side Story being released in December, and La La Land writer's Dear Evan Hansen. In the Heights is an adaptation of smash-hit Hamilton's creator Lin-Manuel Miranda's epic musical that is a staple in contemporary musical theatre. Anthony Ramos stars in the film adaptation as Usnavi, an owner of a bodega in Washington Heights, wanting to sell up and move back to his childhood home in the Dominican Republic. It even got a West-End transfer I was fortunate enough to see when I was a budding musical theatre student trying to sing Cabaret in my spare time.

In the Heights is an excellent translation from the Broadway-style bringing eccentricity and a sense of grandeur to the cinematic language that demands a more intimate look at the character's emotions and interactions. The cinematography by Alice Brooks is exciting and colourful, but really knows when it is appropriate to let a moment

Directed by Jon M. Chu

makes up for it in the talent. Everyone in this film performed their heart out, and it shows.

The changes they made from the musical make sense to keep the flow of the film, unlike most musical films that ignore the source material's interval and hope the audience does not notice the awkward pause where there should be a safety curtain. They made a key decision to add in scenes about Sonny (Usnavi's young cousin), not being able to go to college because he is the son of an undocumented immigrant. Whilst additions like these can sometimes scream as audience pandering or as a way to make the film less song heavy, these scenes added to the overall embedded subtext of gentrification and a community that is not respected. This film does not shy away from the economic struggles Latin-Americans face, but still strives to show how wonderful a world this eroding community is, and the importance of chosen and biological family.

In the Heights is still in select cinemas.

Findon Village Hall Status update

The big news this month is, of course, the relaxation of regulations on activities within the hall. The Trust committee have consulted the current regular users and discussed the feedback and our options. Both the users and the committee are keen to move forward but to be cautious.

We have decided that it makes sense for the individual groups to consider their specific activities in terms of aerosol generation, social distancing etc. and to use their own, activity specific, risk assessments in order to specify the maximum number of people admitted to their sessions. We will continue to expect risk assessments to be in place.

We are maintaining the current requirement for covid cleaning between sessions but reducing the bureaucracy that went with it. All the other measures, such as masks, the one way system, hand sanitising, ventilation etc. we recommend are continued and the signage will remain. However, we recognise that the individual groups are free to exercise their own discretion over these matters. Clearly, we will also be able to accept some new bookings and, perhaps, resume some more of the established regulars who have not been able to return until now. The limits on numbers for these bookings will also be relaxed. We very much hope that more people will be able to enjoy the hall's facilities more often!

Other news includes the fact that Apex Roofing have completed the roof repairs and made a beautiful job of it. We appreciate their generosity very much.

The new website is progressing a little more slowly than hoped but we will get there – all ideas for things you would like to see on the website welcome (and anyone with web skills – you know where to find us!). One change from current practice that I should mention is that, rather than publish FVHT minutes on notice boards inside and outside the hall, in future, they will appear (and be archived) on the website.

Take care and let's hope we will be seeing more and more of each other in the hall in months to come


