Imagine, for a moment, that you're in a marquee; not too difficult - I'm sure most if not all of you have been to a flower show or wedding reception with one at some time. Now, take it a step further; you are surrounded by children and young people (mostly aged 11-16) with a sprinkling of 'oldies' like me, all worshipping and praising God together. At the Diocesan May Camp this year there were some 450 youngsters, a new record! It was a joy and a privilege to be there as a Leader, sharing the exuberant worship and prayerful stillness led by Young Leaders and a Worship Band from a stage at the front. How amazing to see teenagers standing up to give their lives to Christ for the first time, or with a new sense of commitment. How wonderful to witness young people who felt in need of personal prayer having the courage to stand up in the crowd, yet still more wonderful to see how young friends joined their Youth Leaders in laying on hands and praying for these young people. At the times of worship, the Holy Spirit was palpably present, the sense of joy overflowing through everyone present.

then was tasked to choose a youngster to be the first to try the course. Amid a sea of hands, he picked out our Harry Rayment, who then shared the stage with the Bishop as we watched his circuit on screen. Harry did very well, although diplomatically not beating the Bishop's time!



How wonderful to have been a part of all this, with Harry, Ed, Caedan and Alex from our village. I hope next year we will be taking more young people to experience that being Christian is above all else fun! Hopefully in the next magazine we'll have an account from the young people themselves about what Camp meant to them!

Findon Community Village Shop (Registered name will be Findon Village Cooperative Ltd)

A meeting was called on Monday 12th June 2017 by Peter Goldsworthy as Chairman of FPC to give parishioners an opportunity to share views on the recent closure of the village shop & Post Office.

An amazing 300 villagers attended this meeting.

The freehold of the village shop & PO

was to be sold at auction 30^{th} June 2017 with a guide price of £325,000 -

£350,000. The property consists of the

shop and a 2 bedroom 1st floor flat with a rental income of approx £9,800.

The Post Office has agreed that they will re-issue the PO licence if the shop were to reopen.

All staff have indicated that they are willing to stay (they were given no notice or redundancy pay).

Jo O'Dell, the previous owner,

confirmed that the shop was profitable a few years ago in 2014, and the income from the Post Office could be in excess of $\pounds 20,000$.

It was suggested that the village buy the shop and run it as a community shop by issuing 400 shares of \pounds 1,000 each - with a maximum of 40 shares per person. The full \pounds 400,000 needed to be raised in 9 days in order to have all cheques cleared before the auction.

If the purchase was unsuccessful other premises would be considered. Everyone at the meeting was very positive and supportive of the proposal.

On day 1 a staggering total of £72,000 was raised, and at the end of the 9 days more than £400,000. This is a fantastic achievement for the village.

A second meeting of shareholders and volunteers was called on Wednesday

28th June to discuss the way forward. Again, a large crowd attended with standing in the Village Hall grounds. It had been agreed that it would be better to own the Village Shop and run it as required by villagers rather than chancing someone else buying it. With enough funds to make a bid and to cover some buyer fees and start-up costs, Peter Goldsworthy was nominated to bid at the auction.

The sale completion date is 28th July 2017. The shop will need to be fitted out, restocked and an opening date agreed with the Post Office. It will be run by a management team, a full time shop manager and a team of volunteers. The aim will be to have a rota of volunteers so that each day there will be a volunteer, with each volunteer working a half day every 2 weeks. The critical priority will be to appoint a shop manager at the earliest possible date. Members were invited to apply for the Management Committee positions: - A Shop Manager, PR/ Marketing, Chair Person, Treasurer, Secretary, a Volunteer Coordinator and a team of volunteers. All staff who lost their jobs when the shop closed will be reapplying for their previous positions.

Mark McTaggart an advisor from the Plunkett Foundation, a UK charity, was introduced. He will support and advise on getting the company registered and up and running.

Over £400,00 in 9 days! What a result!

There are over 300 community shops in the country and they generally have a very high success rate, which is very encouraging. He explained that the company would be set up as a Community Benefit Society run by a management committee, and with limited liability. Each member would have 1 vote, and an elected

management committee would run the company. Shares in the company would be backed by the freehold value of the property. Any profits must go back into the business, used to pay back shareholders or in community projects. There can be no private financial benefit.

As Findon News goes to print more details will emerge relating to how the Village shop will be set-up and run.

Sussex Police

Tackling elder exploitation in our communities

Katy Bourne, the Police & Crime Commissioner for Sussex, has made tackling elder exploitation one of her top priorities in a bid to protect older people in the county from financial abuse.

She says: "We know that fraud against our older and more vulnerable residents is a growing issue as our population ages and criminals see that fraud is more profitable and less risky than other crimes. In Sussex, fraud has robbed some older people of their entire life savings and left others destitute.

"I have been lobbying the Government to take account of demographics when calculating the amount of funding that is allocated to each police force and to acknowledge the rise in crimes against our elderly.

"The operational response from Sussex Police has also been excellent. They have developed Operation Signature to help protect and support those most at risk of fraud, and the model has been nationally recognised and is being adopted by other police forces.

"The problem is that many people don't realise that they've been a victim of fraud – they think it's just a scam, or they feel foolish and don't want to tell anyone. But scams are fraud and fraud is a crime so I really would urge anyone who's affected by doorstep crime, postal fraud or nuisance calls to report it."

You can call the police on 101 or report fraud by speaking directly to the advisers at Action Fraud, the national fraud reporting centre, by phoning 0300 123 2040. They will also be able to give you help and advice about fraud and you can remain anonymous if you prefer.

UK-wide charity Action on Elder Abuse operates a confidential helpline on 080 8808 8141 which offers advice and support on all aspects of elder abuse.

Trading Standards also want to know about online fraud or mobile phone scams; any information you share may help them shut down fraudsters before others fall victim to them. You can report incidents, whether you're a victim or have just been targeted, via the Citizen's Advice Consumer Helpline on 0345 404 05 06.

A Gardener's View

If I could grab your attention for just a moment regarding my services. As my business has grown and blossomed (pardon the pun) I have been overwhelmed with how many of you have contacted me and welcomed me into your gardens. However I am unable to continue one of my services. I am no longer going to a provide a regular weekly gardening service. This will mean I am able to take on new jobs, new customers and new projects. My services range from the smallest garden job to the largest complete design and everything in between so please feel free to contact me for all your gardening needs.

July is one of my favourite months of the year. June gives you a month of growth. Plants start to fill their space and prepare for their bold flowering in July. It is a month of joy and the garden can look truly amazing. It also means harvest time. You cannot beat sticking your fork into the ground and pulling up the pale round gems that are new potatoes. The nights are bright and you can garden almost until eleven o clock. It is great for eating outdoors you can sit back with a plate of home grown produce with a vase of sweet peas on the table and enjoy the bright energy and essence of the first half of Summer. At this time of year I spend my time

cutting back the Geraniums in the borders. This will both stop them smothering other plants and give them a second flush of flowers later in the year. You can be quite brutal with this and cut them down to soil level. Give them a drink and before you know it fresh new leaves will begin to appear. By cutting them down this also gives you more space to plant Autumn bulbs close to the plants that will die down in the Winter.

Here is my top 10 jobs this month

- 1. Check clematis for signs of clematis wilt
- 2. Care for houseplant while on holiday
- 3. Water tubs and new plants if dry, but be water-wise
- 4. Deadhead bedding plants and repeat-flowering perennials, to ensure continuous flowering
- 5. Pick courgettes before they become marrows
- 6. Treat apple scab
- Clear algae, blanket weeds and debris from ponds, and keep them topped up
- 8. Order catalogues for next year's spring-flowering bulbs
- Give the lawn a quick-acting summer feed, especially if not given a spring feed
- 10.Sow fast growing vegtable crop such as raddish and lettuce

Parish Council Report - June 2017

The month of June has been dominated by the sudden and unexpected closure of the Post Office and shop, when the owners abandoned Findon, their staff and indeed gave no warning to the Post Office Ltd.

Three weeks of frantic and heart-warming support from nearly 300 villagers has resulted in us being able to prepare to bid for the freehold of the shop and flat above at auction on June 30th.

The normal business of the council continues, with a full FPC meeting on Monday 26th June when we expect to elect a new Chairman, the undersigned has decided to step down 'for a rest', but fully intends to continue as councillor.

Meanwhile the working party formed to examine the possibility of amending the Findon Neighbourhood Plan proceeds, with a membership from all areas of the village. The group is looking specifically at the Housing and Design element of the plan, and wishes to challenge the allocations made by SDNPA which the council objected to at the time of announcement. Their Chairman David Hutchison had a reasonable reception when he addressed the SDNPA Planning Committee on June 20th, and FPC will support their work, at least until it is presented and assessed by the independent examiner.

A large group of villagers from the Quadrangle presented an appeal to have the Allotment Gardens site protected as designated allotments, at the Planning Committee meeting on 22nd June. The site has been privately owned for many years, and the council has no jurisdiction to realistically influence its future, with the owner determined to retain the site for future housing development.

The planning of this year's Sheep Fair is now well advanced, all stalls have been sold, the demand for sheep entries is increasing, volunteers have been recruited, and the tickets for the Friday and Saturday dances will be on sale as Findon News is published.

We have been so busy with so many extra cats coming in. Being open every Sunday, we have lots of visitors looking for cats so luckily most of the cats are quickly reserved.

This week we were told that three local Rescues in Sussex have closed so we think this must be why we have been extra, extra busy. Our telephone never stops.

This time of year we are also busy with baby birds. We recently had a baby Woodpecker that had flown into a window. Sheila drove the bird to Brent Lodge Wildlife Hospital in Sidlesham. After it had recovered they said to come and pick up the Woodpecker so it could be released in the same area. I went and collected it and then released it. We like to think he flew back to join his family.

Tonight I was asked to take in a baby Seagull which had fallen off a high building. They are so fluffy and cute with webbed feet they look like baby ducklings. It was a bit unsteady on its feet so I took it to Brent Lodge Hospital. I said "I hope you have another baby to keep it company". She laughed and said "We have hundreds!"

They also have three hundred baby Hedgehogs to feed. They have been appealing for Volunteers to come and help feed all this year's babies. There were just two Volunteers working this evening, coping with all the feeding. A couple also arrived with a baby Robin. The poor Volunteer was very upset because a man on the phone had just shouted and swore at her and called her useless because she said she couldn't go out and pick up a bird he had. She asked him to bring it in but he said "It was her job to go and get it"! People can be so horrible, a cat owner rang us and said to Sheila if you don't come and take this cat I will hit it over the head with a shovel and kill it.

Brent Lodge is a wonderful wildlife hospital. They never close, they work so hard. We often take injured creatures to them in the evenings. They are all always so friendly and helpful, smiling every time we turn up with an animal or bird. We are so lucky they are always there for us.
